## **Domestic Violence Homicide Defined**

### **Domestic Violence Homicide as defined by the North Carolina Coalition Against Domestic Violence.**

Domestic violence homicides occur when a person murders their current or former intimate partner and/or their children. A domestic violence homicide includes the murder of third parties. Examples include the murder of relatives of the person's former or current intimate partner, someone attempting to protect their current or former intimate partner, or the current intimate partner of the person's ex-partner. Domestic violence homicides include acts of self defense against an abusive partner.

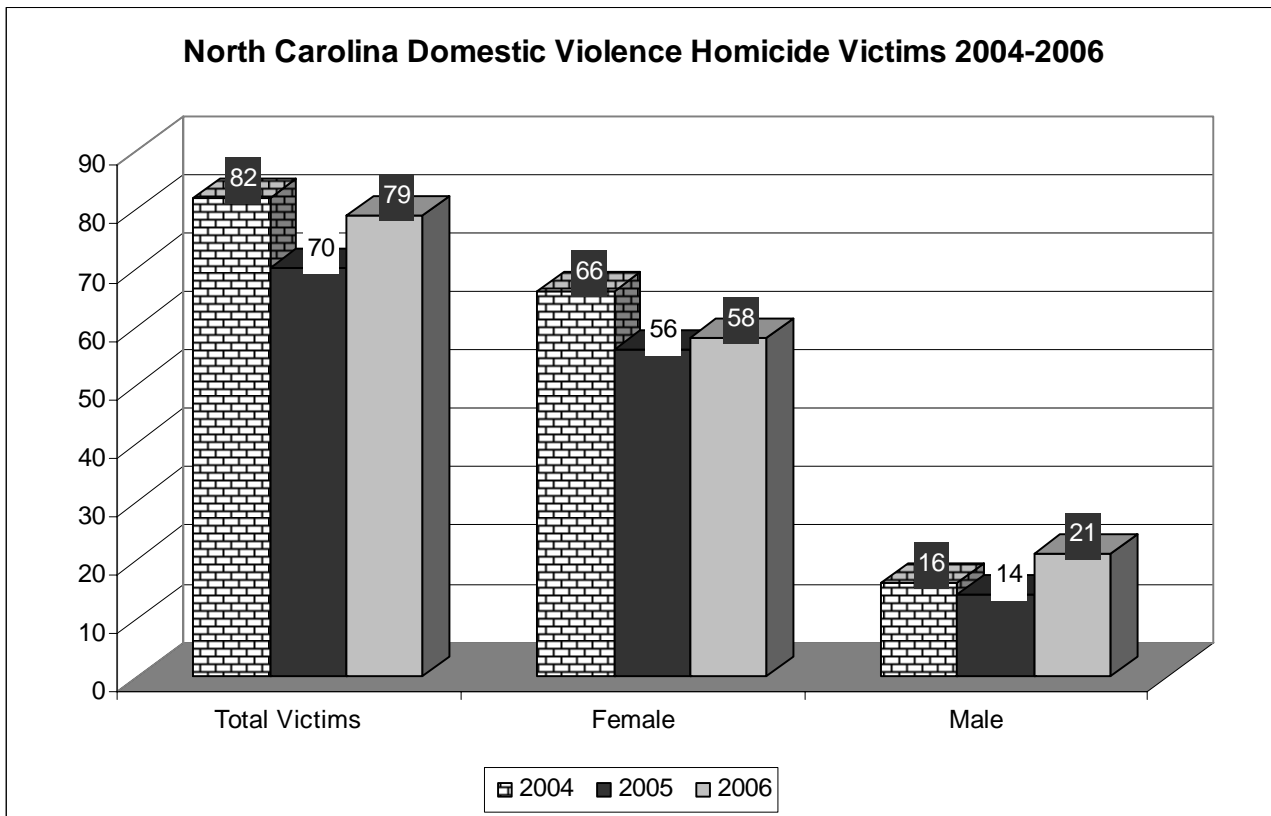

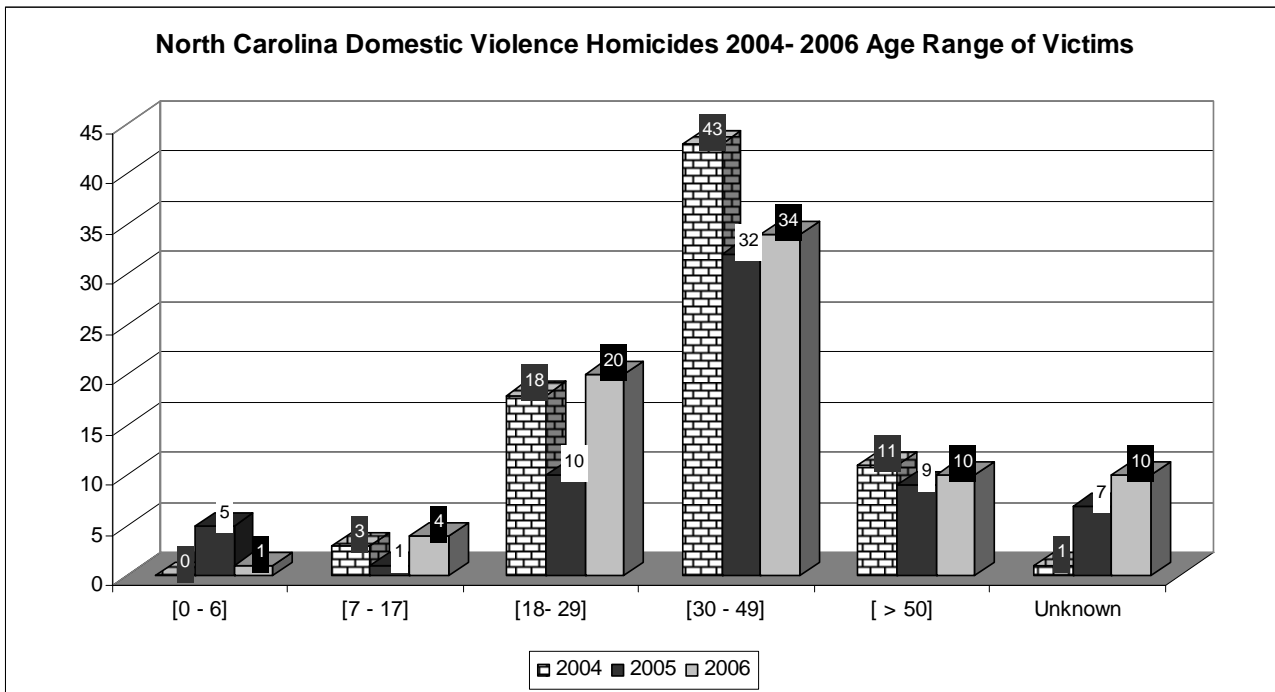

- ★ **79 deaths occurred due to domestic violence in North Carolina in 2006.**
- ★ **This number does not accurately reflect the total toll of domestic-violence related deaths, because the Coalition must rely on reports from individual counties.**
- ★ **Every year, the number of women killed as a result of domestic violence far exceeds the number of men killed.**
- ★ **Of the 21 male victims, two were children, of the 58 female victims, three were children.**

★ **Victims between 18 and 35 years of age are among the most vulnerable to domestic violence homicides.**

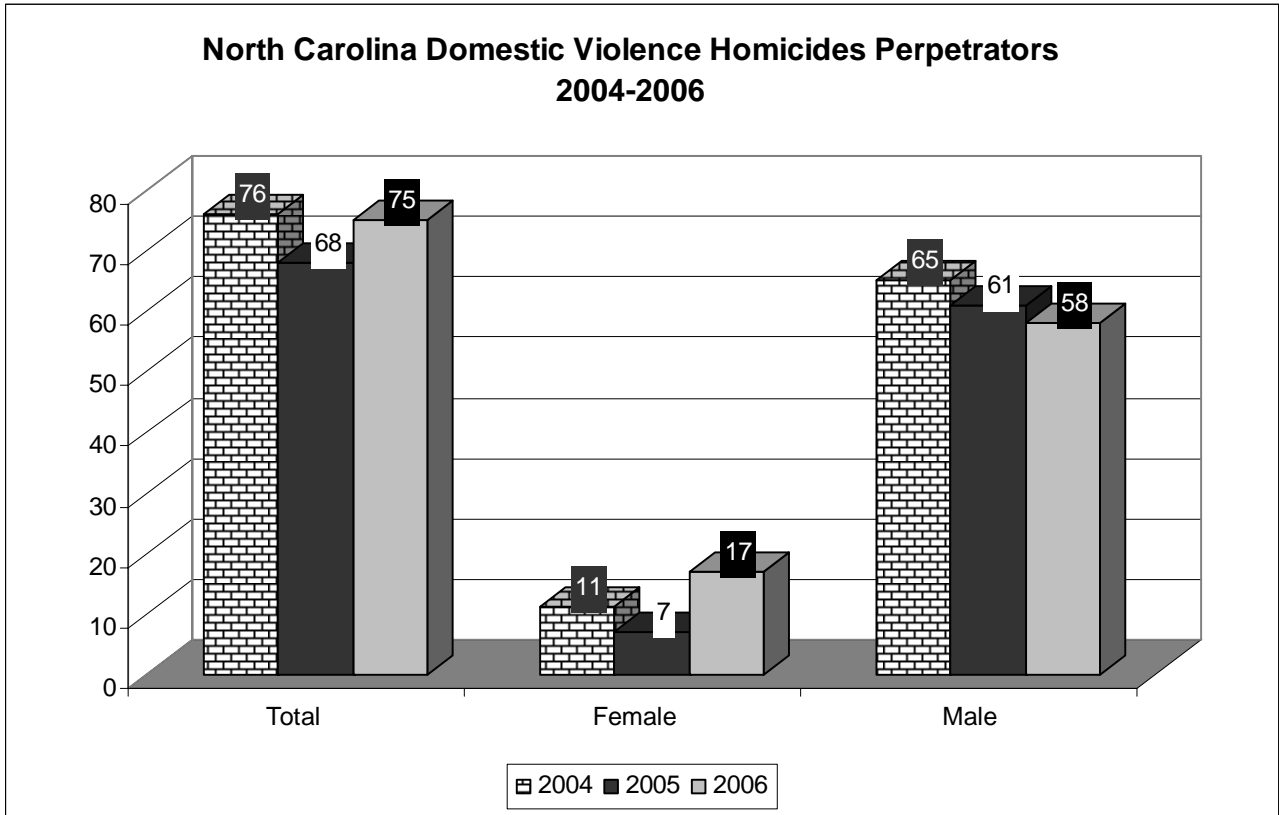
## **Impact on Children**

- ★ Five children killed in North Carolina in 2006 as a result of domestic-violence.
- ★ Two victims, one 5, the other 8, were killed by their father because their mother refused to go back to him.
- ★ One child victim was a 10-year-old boy whose father shot him and his brother in the head after his wife said she was leaving him. The brother survived.
- ★ One victim was killed while her two children were trying to save her.
- ★ We know of at least 35 children who were present during a domestic violence homicide, in 22 separate incidents. Undoubtedly, there were many more child witnesses to domestic violence homicides that we could not confirm.

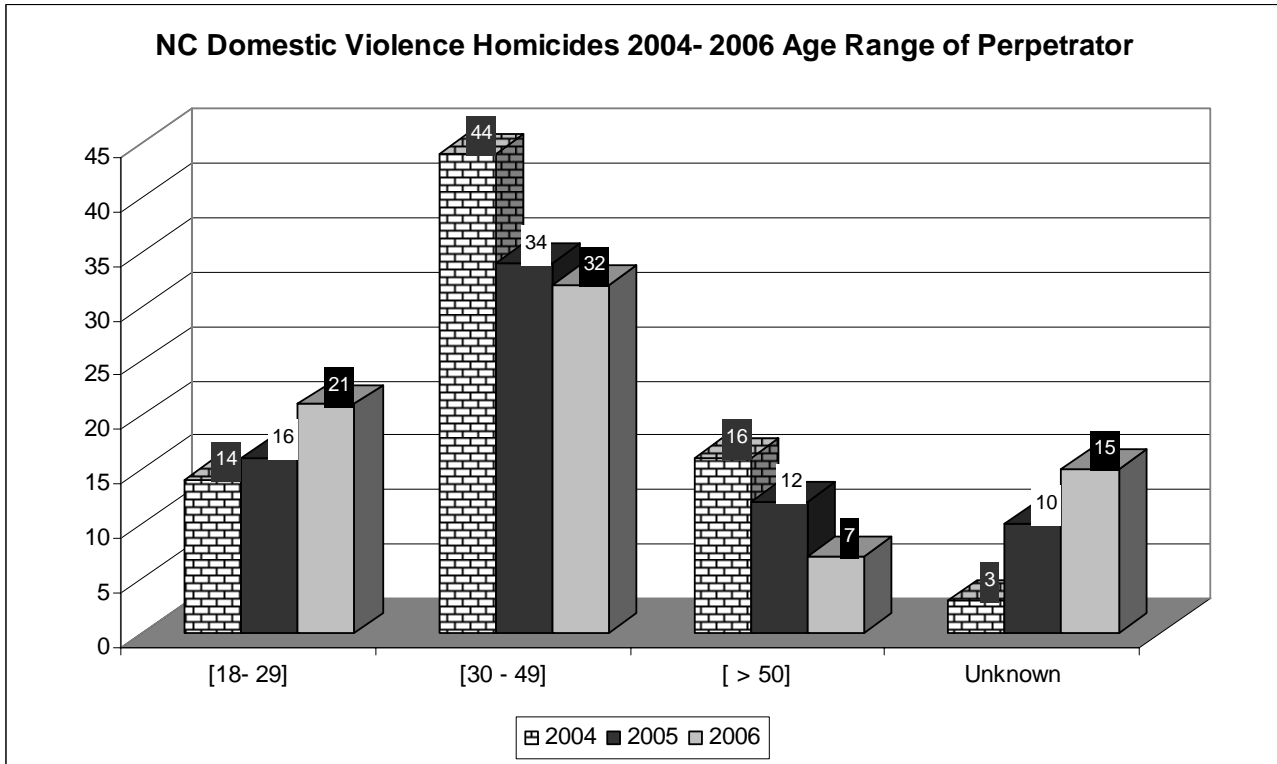
- ★ 75 men and women committed domestic-violence related homicides in North Carolina in 2006.
- ★ Each year, the number of male perpetrators of domestic-violence homicides far exceeds that of female perpetrators.
- ★ One homicide was committed by multiple perpetrators.
- ★ Four perpetrators committed multiple homicides.

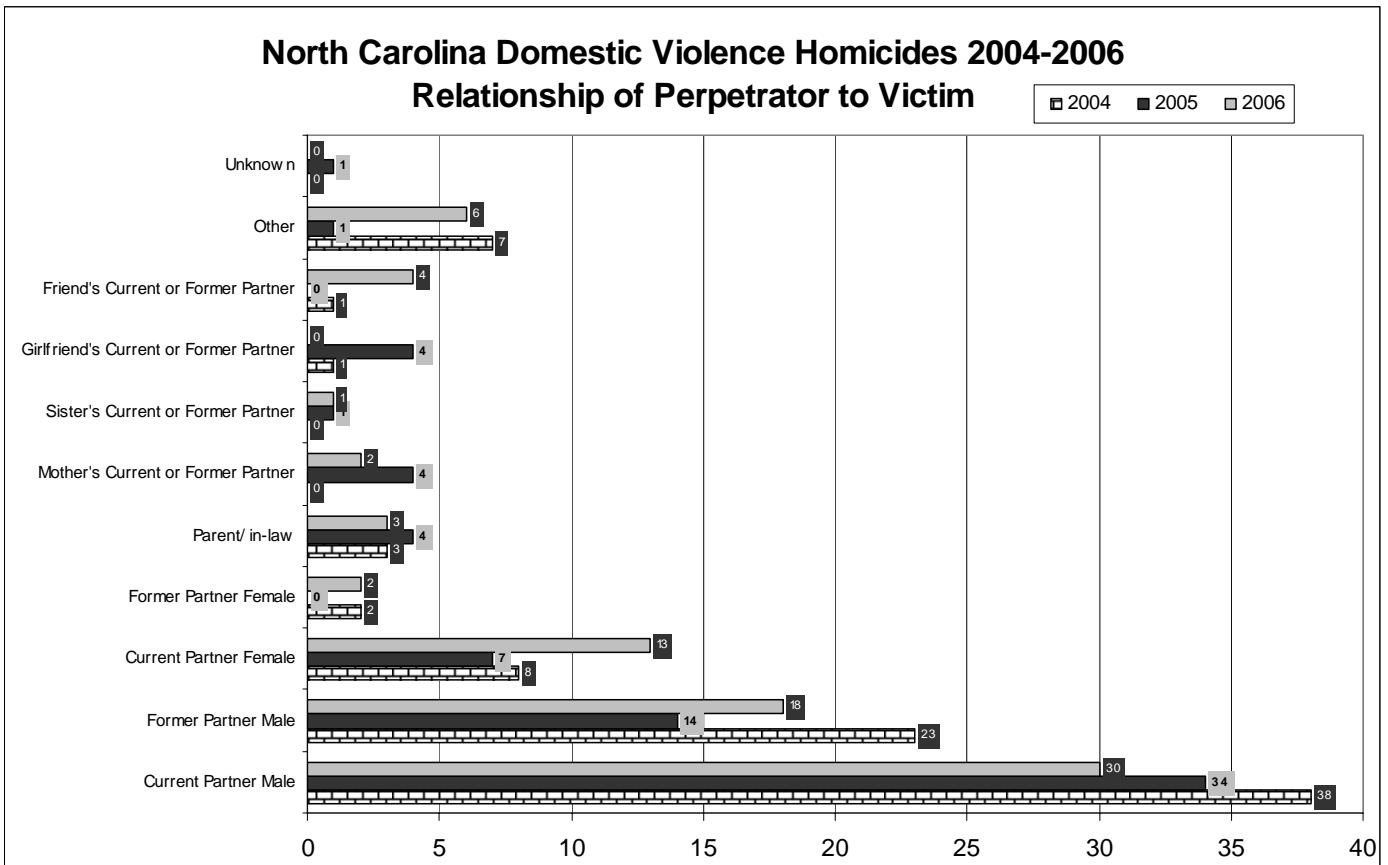

## Relationship of Perpetrator to Victim (continued)

- ★ Domestic violence endangers not only the victim of the abuse but also the close friends and family members of the victim. Children, brothers, friends and current partners of abused women are all part of the domestic violence homicide count in North Carolina.
- ★ **The majority of the perpetrators were a current or former male partner of a female victim.**

- ★ Six domestic violence homicides were by a male parent or guardian of the victim (four were by a father and two were by a mother’s boyfriend).
- ★ **The domestic violence victim was often not safe even after separating from the abuser.** Leaving an intimate partner is a dangerous issue for battered women. Statistics show that 15 victims were killed by their estranged husbands and ex-boyfriends in 2006.

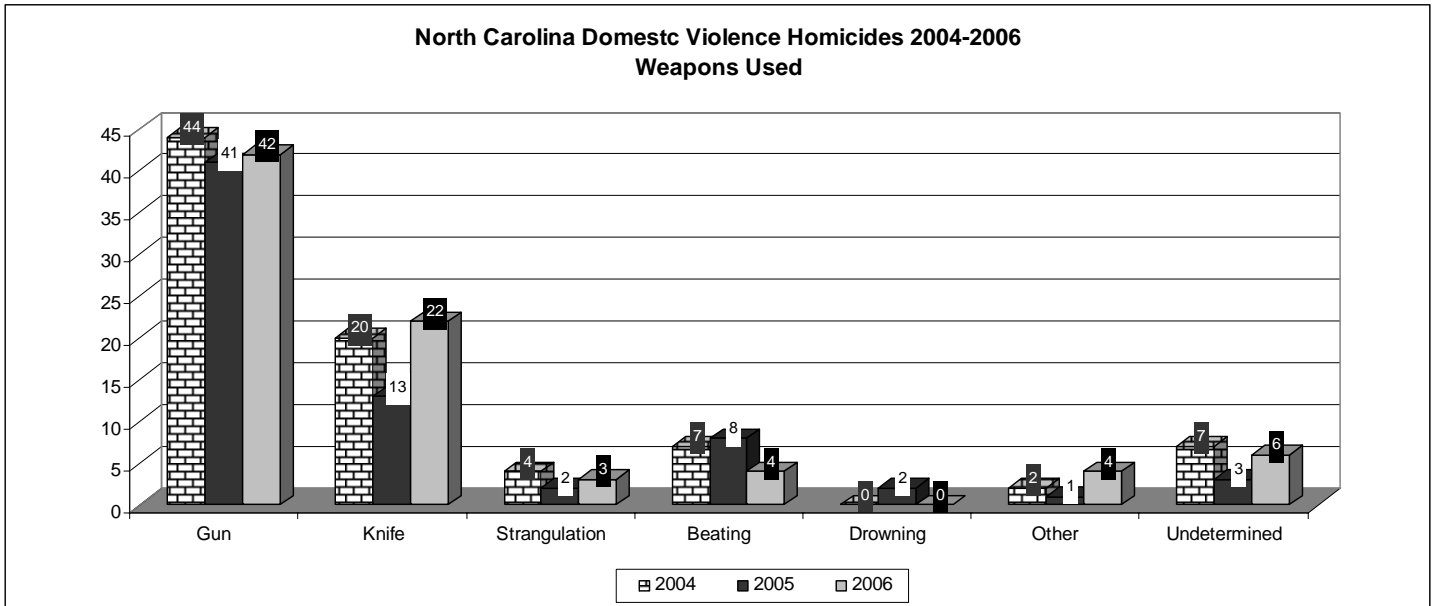

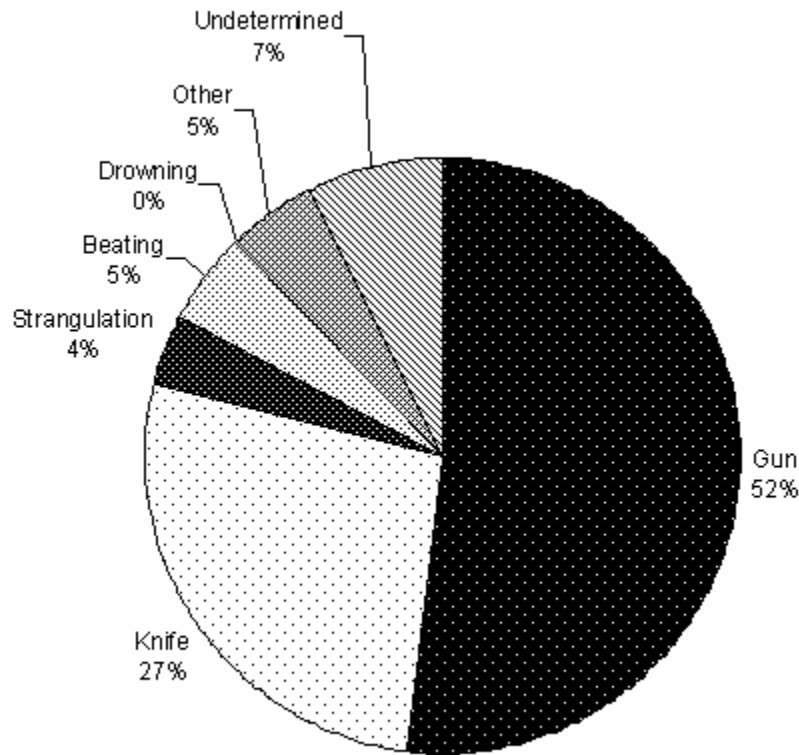
## Type of Weapon

### Type of Weapon (continued)



- ★ More than half (52 percent) of the domestic violence homicides in North Carolina in 2006 involved guns.
- ★ At least four victims were killed by the perpetrator beating them to death with his hands, in two other cases victims were beaten with other objects and in one case with a baseball bat.
